

## **Access Rider**

### What is an Access Rider?

- An Access Rider is a document that details your individual access requirements.
- Anyone can use an Access Rider to make sure any reasonable adjustments they need to perform a job are taken into consideration from the beginning.
- Using an Access Rider helps individuals and organisations (like a gallery or events team) feel comfortable and sure about working together.
- Once you have completed your Access Rider, you can take it to any venues and organisations you work with.

#### What is in this Access Rider?

The Access Rider has 4 parts:

- 1. Your details: name, job or role, and contact information.
- 2. Your access requirements: what adjustments you want during your job or role.
- 3. Emergency information: what we need to know about you in case of an emergency.
- 4. Further information: any other relevant information you want to share.

# Who will see the information in your Access Rider?

- Any organisation you share your Access Rider with should only share it with the people responsible for supporting and managing you in your role.
- Organisations should not share this document with anyone else without your permission.
